
## TRAIL HIGHLIGHTS

- ! Bears present -- make noise
- ! Some trails require route-finding skills



Its unique geology, vibrant ecosystem, and the ever-present sense of wilderness make it an unforgettable experience, solidifying its reputation as one of Alaska's most beautiful areas.

### Independence Mine & Gold Rush History

Beyond its natural splendor, Hatcher Pass is steeped in the fascinating history of Alaska's gold rush era. At the heart of the pass lies Independence Mine State Historical Park, a beautifully preserved testament to the hardy prospectors and miners who once toiled here. In the early 20th century, this area boomed with the discovery of gold, leading to the establishment of the Independence Mine, which became one of Alaska's largest hard rock gold mines.

Visitors can explore a collection of historic wooden buildings, including the mine manager's house, bunkhouses, and the main mill, all set against a stunning mountain backdrop. A visitor center provides interpretive exhibits, offering a glimpse into the challenging lives of the miners and the complex process of extracting gold from the mountainsides. Hiking trails around the park allow for further exploration of the mining remnants, blending an educational journey through history with the invigorating experience of an alpine trek.

### Best Trails

Hatcher Pass offers a diverse range of hiking experiences, from relatively gentle strolls around the historical park to challenging multi-day expeditions into the backcountry.

### Reed Lakes Trail

Perhaps the most popular and iconic hike in Hatcher Pass, the Reed Lakes Trail is a strenuous but incredibly rewarding journey. Beginning near the historical park, the trail winds through a picturesque valley, crossing streams and climbing steadily. The initial segment leads to the stunning Lower Reed Lake, a vibrant turquoise body of water nestled in a dramatic cirque. For those seeking more, the trail continues with a steeper climb to

Upper Reed Lake, passing a beautiful waterfall along the way. This 9-mile round trip hike involves significant elevation gain and rocky terrain but rewards hikers with unparalleled views of glacial lakes, towering peaks like Lynx Peak, and opportunities to
